#### THE EFFECTS OF COVID-19 CONTINUE

By executive order, schools closed in March 2020 due to the pandemic caused by an infectious virus, and COVID-19 continues to redefine the operational modes of families, communities, and educational services. In response to the initial onslaught, remote learning became a necessity and now, online learning has found permanent residency in education. In the 2020-21 school year, an average of 1,500 students were enrolled in Caldwell Connect, the remote option. Beginning in August 2021, the online learning platform enrolled 314 students, even though it was more fully developed and renamed to Caldwell Online for middle and high school students. Parents and students indicated a preference for inperson learning. However, at any given time, teachers are trained, prepared, and equipped to go remote.

The Caldwell Early College High School, innovative high school on the campus of Caldwell Community College, graduated 100 percent in 2021. Students graduate in four or five years with at least one Associate's degree and a jump start on a Bachelor's.


